Teach:

Christ's Process of Surrender Phil. 2:5-8 (read)

- 1. Obedience unto death
- 2. He gave up His equality with God voluntarily.
- 3. He gave up His right to exercise His divine power
- 4. He emptied Himself becoming a slave in a human body, and humbled Himself in obedience to the point of death on the cross.

Note: The word "emptied" literally means that He laid aside His privileges. He gave up the exercise of His divine attributes, using His deity only under the power of the Holy Spirit at the command of His father. (cf. John 14:10,24; 5;19,30) All his privileges were ultimately laid aside as he battled the pain of death in the garden of Gethsemane. He faced the cross with all rights surrendered and with a willingness to suffer humiliation. (cf. Heb 5:7-8)

- a. Philippians 2:5 exhorts us to have the same attitude that Christ had.
- b. The same emptying and the same surrendering of all rights and privileges
- c. The same willingness to suffer humiliation must precede the experiential cross of Luke 9:23-24

Philippians 3:7-10 (read)

Paul counted all things loss for the sake of Christ.

There is a purpose in our suffering – to know Christ more.

Is it worth it to suffer loss to know Christ?

1Peter 4:12-13; 5:10 (read) 2Corinthians 1:3-10 (read)

Origin of Suffering

God (Is. 45:6,7) With Adam and Eve in Genesis

Suffering is a consequence of sin. (Rom 5:12)

Suffering is ordained by God

Suffering is our birthright (inherited)

Suffering **is!** (Was, is now, and will be)

Brokenness

- The process whereby a believer's coping mechanisms are nullified, the bankruptcy of the flesh is fully revealed, and the self-life is exchanged for Christ's life.

Ex. Joseph

God uses evil for good

"...you intended to harm me, but God intended it for good..." (NIV)

Ex. New Testament

To Manifest His Power

John 9:3 - Jesus answered, "It was not that this man sinned, or his parents, but that the works of God might be made manifest in him."

Purpose of Brokenness:

- 1. Exposes the flesh and that it doesn't work
- 2. Get our attention
- 3. Bring us to end of self (Rom. 7:24)
- 4. Provide an opportunity to reveal Christ's life (2 Cor. 1:8-9)
- 5. To conform us to the image of Christ. (Rom 8:29)

- 6. Depend upon God
- 7. Sovereignty of God

Evil can not touch me without first going through God and when it finally hits me it is really hitting Christ (since He is my life and He and I are one).

Christians will suffer, but God is there with us.

<u>Psalms 34:18,19</u> - "The Lord is near to the brokenhearted, and saves those who are crushed in spirit. Many are the afflictions of the righteous; but the Lord delivers him out of them all."

God wants us to be victorious **in and through** the suffering (not to try and escape from it).

Why can I choose to welcome sufferings?

Rom. 5:3-5 - I exalt in my tribulations (NASB) ... I rejoice in my sufferings (NIV). The trial brings about (His/Christ's) perseverance, patience, proven character, hope and eventually God's love.

Because without them, I cannot reach spiritual maturity. Just as light shows up best in darkness, so patience shows up best in trying situations ... love shows up best next to unlovable people ... joy shows up best in difficult times ... peace shows up best in stressful circumstances, etc.

Results of enduring suffering:

- a. Trials enable us to help and comfort others. (II Cor. 1:3-5)
- b. Adversity refines us and brings out the life of Christ. (Isa. 48:10)
- c. Makes scripture come alive to us ... especially the Psalms.
- d. Through the trials we learn how to appropriate Christ as Life.
- e. Strength (God's strength) shows up best in weakness. (Il Cor. 12:9, 10)
- f. It enables us to show others that life does not consist of health, materials possessions, job, family, reputation, etc. It consists of Christ.
- g. Life comes out of death. (II Cor. 4:7-12)
- h. It keeps me humble and God gives grace to the humble. (James 4:6, I Peter 5:5)

When Paul was given a thorn in the flesh to keep him humble and dependent on God, Paul called this "messenger of Satan" a gift from God. (II Cor. 12:7-10)

Response to Brokenness - Total Surrender

The complete abandonment of all rights to myself and everything I have to God for the purpose of appropriating my revealed death in a living sacrifice.

Total Surrender Involves

- -Willing for God's will to be done
- -Giving God permission to do whatever He wants with us
- -Relinquishment or surrender of all rights
- -Not just committing my talents, time or body for God to use, instead a surrendering of total self with all rights, privileges and expectations to be rendered broken, weakened, and helpless in my participation in death.
- -It gives God permission to do with me as He pleases in order to bring me to the place of death experientially.

Note: It is important that we surrender to God's love and not to His power. If we surrender to His power we have resignation rather than relinquishment.

- -Total surrender may have been repeated many times for the counselee
- -God may have other things to illumine.
- -There may be a stripping process necessary to bring the person to the end of himself. Ex. Peeling an onion

Go over cruise ship illustration

How does a person know they are broken? Go over "evidence of brokenness" and "total surrender" worksheet

Go over total surrender and prayer for surrender

Ex. Stuck in traffic, get angry. What is the right perceived? I have a right to be home in 30 min.

Notice red flags this week: negative emotions...anger, irritated, disappointed...and identify the right associated with the emotion
